KINDEGARTEN AND GROUNDS UPDATE



Work to prepare the site for the kindergarten has continued over the summer break. The new playgrounds are complete, and they look amazing, but unfortunately these will not be in operation this term due to how close they are to the heavy machinery operating on site. There have been lots of interested spectators!



One of our bat-tennis courts was re-surfaced and once the shipping container (which we are using as temporary storage) is removed, we will commence planning for the remaining asphalted area to be rejuvenated.



Concreting works were also completed to widen one of our walkways and to lay a slab for our table tennis tables. I received an exciting email yesterday, our table tennis tables are about to depart Perth and should be here within the next week or so!



SCHOOL ASSEMBLIES

SCHOOL COUNCIL NOTICE OF ELECTION AND CALL FOR NOMINATIONS

School Council plays an important role in the governance of our school and works closely with the Principal to support the strategic direction, priorities and improvement of Reservoir Views Primary School. School Council is involved in areas such as:

- *setting the school's strategic direction*
- *approving and monitoring the school budget*
- *developing, reviewing and monitoring school policies*
- *supporting the school's values and community engagement*

School Council is required to meet 8 times per year (approx. 2 times per term). School Council members and members of the school community are also invited to join one of the School Council Subcommittees:

- *Community*
- *Finance*
- *Buildings and Grounds*

The dates for the 2026 School Council meetings will be set during the first meeting once the election process concludes. They will run from 6pm to 7:30pm.

We are now calling for nominations to fill a number of School Council positions, as several current 2025 members are reaching the end of their term of office.

Key dates:

Nominations close: 4.00pm on **Wednesday 11 February 2026**
Ballot closes (if required): 4.00pm on **Wednesday 25 February 2026**

Positions available:

Parent members: 5 positions (2-year term)

Nomination forms are available from the school office. Completed nomination forms must be returned to the school by the nomination closing date.

Following the close of nominations, a list of candidates will be displayed at the school. If the number of nominations exceeds the number of available positions, a ballot will be conducted. If the number of nominations is fewer than the vacancies, a further call for nominations will be made.

Being part of School Council is a meaningful way to contribute to our school community, work collaboratively with families and staff, and support the continued growth and success of RVPS. I warmly encourage parents/carers who are interested to consider nominating.

SCHOOL ATTENDANCE / PUNCTUALITY

Student attendance will continue to be a whole school focus this year. We understand absence from school is unavoidable at times with illness etc but attending school regularly is vital for all students in Foundation to Grade 6 so that they can access all they need to learn throughout their 7 years of primary schooling.

Students being present at line up areas prior to 9am is also incredibly important. I will add that staff are on yard duty from 8:45am each morning.

STAFF CAR PARK

For obvious safety reasons, can I please ask all students and families **NOT** to enter the school through the staff car park, please use the main entrance gate. Thank you.

PARKING / CAR SAFETY AROUND OUR SCHOOL / PLEASE USE SUPERVISED CROSSING AREAS

Could I also request that all of our families follow the parking restrictions/rules that are in place during school drop-off and pick-up times around our school and please practise safe road crossing and abide by driving laws and common sense. The parking restrictions are there for a reason - to keep school crossing areas free from obstruction and ultimately to keep our community safe.

Can I please urge all families to use the supervised school crossings on Hickford St. and St. Vigeons Rd and not take a shortcut in between cars, it may save a minute of your trip, but it's just not worth taking the risk. We have had many near misses over the years.

The main entrance gate on Hickford St is locked from 3:20ish each day with the only exit on Hickford St next to the school crossing.

SUN SMART

Just a reminder that we are a SunSmart school and from the 1st of September until the end of April, it is compulsory for all students to wear a SunSmart hat (wide-brimmed or legionnaire style) for all outdoor activities. Hats are available at the office. If you would like your child to apply sunscreen, it's easiest for them to have the roll-on applicator. I have included some information for families from SunSmart below. We have also purchased sunscreen for every classroom and students will be encouraged to apply prior to each break.

MEDICAL INFORMATION

A reminder to please complete and send back to school ASAP the medical information form that was sent home this week. Also don't forget to check with us if Ventolin, EpiPen or any medication has expired and needs replacing.

CSEF

If you hold a current Health Care Card, please do not forget to apply for the CSEF (Camp, Sports and Excursion Fund).

UNIFORM

ANNIVERSARY OF THE APOLOGY TO THE STOLEN GENERATIONS



In 2008, then-Prime Minister Kevin Rudd apologised on behalf of the Australian Government to the Stolen Generations – the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children who were forcibly removed from their families and communities by successive colonial and Australian governments.

Next Friday the 13th of February is the 18th anniversary of this significant event and it is an important time to reflect on how Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples have been, and will continue to be affected by past policies of the Australian Government. We are committed at Reservoir Views to telling the truth about Australia's history, reflecting on past injustices while acknowledging the strength, resilience and cultural identity of Indigenous Australians.

BEGINNING THE NEW SCHOOL YEAR

Settling In and Building Belonging

The beginning of each school year, and the start of every term, is an important time for students to settle into routines, build relationships and feel confident in their learning environment. While these skills are developed across the year, our school places a strong focus on them in the first weeks of Term 1 and the first week of each term to support a smooth transition and set students up for success.

Classroom Routines and Expectations

Teachers work with students to establish clear, consistent routines for daily classroom life, including entering the room, organising belongings, moving between learning tasks, using learning and play spaces appropriately and asking for help. These routines are revisited at the beginning of each term to support calm, focus and predictability throughout the day.

This learning is closely aligned with the Personal and Social Capability curriculum. Students are supported to practise respectful communication, manage emotions, resolve minor conflicts and develop a strong sense of belonging within their classroom and the wider school community.

Student Voice and Agency

Students are active partners in shaping their learning environment. Through guided discussions, they share ideas, ask questions and help develop classroom expectations. This strengthens student voice and agency and supports students to understand not only what the expectations are, but why they matter.

Working Together with Families

Families play an important role in supporting these routines at home. Simple actions such as ensuring take-home readers are returned, encouraging children to talk about their learning and friendships, and maintaining consistent routines help students feel settled and confident at school.

Thank you for your continued support. When school and home work together, shared expectations and routines help children feel safe, confident and ready to engage in learning each day.

BUILDING A POSITIVE START WITH SWPBS

At Reservoir Views Primary School, School Wide Positive Behaviour Support (SWPBS) is a key part of how we build a positive, inclusive and supportive school culture. SWPBS focuses on explicitly teaching shared expectations, acknowledging positive choices and supporting students to learn the skills they need to be successful at school.

At the beginning of the school year, we focus on teaching and modelling these behaviour expectations so students clearly understand what positive, respectful and safe behaviour looks like across all areas of the school. This approach supports students to feel confident, connected and ready to learn.

Starting the year with a strong focus on SWPBS sets a positive tone for the year ahead. Research shows that when positive behaviours are explicitly taught and acknowledged, students experience greater wellbeing, stronger relationships and increased engagement in learning.

Families can view our school expectations in the SWPBS matrix below and are encouraged to continue conversations at home about positive choices and recognising effort and success.

MATHS AROUND US

We will also be sharing **Family Maths Moments** in our newsletter, offering simple ideas to explore maths together at home (twice termly).


In addition, we look forward to welcoming families to **Maths Games Afternoons**, where students can share their learning through fun, hands-on activities (once per term).

FAMILY MATHS MOMENTS

Setting up a home calendar

(You can often find free wall calendars at pharmacies, banks or local businesses at the beginning of the year.)

- add special family events to your calendar
- cross off the days as they pass to show elapsed time
- use the ideas below to support your child's mathematical thinking

Foundation – Year 2:

Exploring Days, Seasons and Numbers

Find today's date and count

- What number is today?
- How many days until the weekend or a special event?

Say and notice the days

- Say the days of the week in order
- What day is it today? What day was yesterday? What day is tomorrow?
- Can you start from Wednesday and keep going?

Explore seasons and weather

- What season is it now? How do you know? (Look at the weather, clothes, plants)
- Add weather or season symbols

Years 3 – 6:

Using Calendars to Plan and Problem-Solve

Say and use the months of the year

- Say the months in order together
- What month comes before/after this one?
- What month will it be in three months' time?

Add important dates

- Use the school newsletter to find key events
- Add term dates, excursions, sports days, assemblies, and other special activities to your calendar
- Add family events, birthdays and celebrations

Work out time gaps

- How many days until the next event, your birthday, or the holidays?
- How many days between two school events or between now and the end of term?

Plan ahead

- What date will it be in one week or two weeks?
- What will the date be after a long weekend?

Notice calendar features

- Look at how the days go from the end of one month to the start of the next
- Can you spot which day the new month begins?
- What happens to the numbers after the month changes?



Extra Challenge:

Problem solving, fractions, equivalence

Explore months as fractions of a year

1 month = 1/12 of a year (1 month of 12)

2 months = 2/12 of a year OR 1/6 of a year

3 months = 3/12 of a year OR 1/4 of a year

- What fraction of the year has passed so far?
- What fraction of the year is left?
- When will we be half way through the year?
- When will three-quarters of the year be complete?

WELCOME PICNIC


It was so lovely to see and meet so many family members at our Welcome Picnic! Thank you to everyone who was able to attend and join us for this special afternoon.
