WALK SAFELY TO SCHOOL DAY

Tomorrow is Walk Safely To School Day. The objectives of WSTSD are:

- To encourage parents and carers to walk to school with primary school age children and **reinforce safe pedestrian behaviour**.
- To promote the health benefits of walking and help create regular walking habits at an early age.
- To ensure that children up to 10 years old hold an adult's hand when crossing the road.
- To **help children develop the vital road-crossing skills they will need as they become mature pedestrians**.
- To reduce the car dependency habits that are being created at an early age and which will be difficult to change as children become adults.
- To promote the use of Public Transport.
- To reduce the level of air pollution created by motor vehicles.
- To reduce the level of traffic congestion.



Reinforcing safe pedestrian behaviour with our children is so incredibly important. I am incredibly passionate about the safety of every child that attends Reservoir Views, and every child in general, including when it comes to crossing roads.

I am deeply concerned about unsafe road-crossing and driving/parking behaviour around our school. We have supervised school crossing areas on Hickford St and St Vigeons Rd for a clear purpose - to ensure adults and children can cross safely without the danger of being struck by a vehicle, parking signs/restrictions are also there for a clear purpose - to ensure our supervised crossing areas have a clear line of sight, are not congested and allow for families to drop and go.

Can I please ask that everyone makes a conscious effort to help children develop vital road-crossing skills, please use the supervised crossing areas and abide by local parking regulations. Everyday should be a walk/travel to school safely day.



Our Edendale Farm excursion was the highlight of our fortnight/ year so far. We had the best time and our teacher's praised us for being so well behaved. This experience has linked itself nicely to our Inquiry focus on rubbish and waste, and our Writing this week (we're writing a book on our experience which makes us authors!). A big thank you to Angela, Marie, Winnie, and Tim who came along and helped us with our learning.



A request from Mr. Dylan and Ms. Lou - as the weather turns and we transition into Winter we're noticing children returning from play wet or drenched from the wet grass or equipment. Could you please pack a spare change of clothes (underwear, shirt and pants) in your child's bag? The office does not have an unlimited supply of spare clothes and this will save you the hassle of being phoned/ asked to bring in a change of clothes. Thank you.

Inquiry - Our trip to Edendale Farm allowed us to explore different types of waste and where it ends up. We learned that not everything should go to landfill and more than 75% of what ends up in our bins can be recycled or reused. Previously our Inquiry unit taught us about 'decomposition' and we discovered how long man-made waste (like plastic) takes to break down, reinforcing the importance of recycling. We made art from recycled materials with the focus of giving our creation a super-power to help look after our planet. We also learned about composting, facts about the worms that inhabit worm farms (worms have no eyes, ears, or tongues, but do have 5 hearts), and even got to handle real-life worms!

Literacy - We have become real-life authors, writing all about our Edendale Farm visit! We're continuing to focus on sentences and have begun exploring adjectives (describing words) through our excursion experience. Some adjectives we came up with to describe how the worm felt include squishy, tickly, slimy, and even moist!

Numeracy - We have reached 50 days of school - half way to our 100 day countdown! We continue our focus on numbers to 20 and have begun exploring collections (groups of objects), more and less, and measurement.

Minibeast Fun!

This term, we have been learning about minibeasts as part of our inquiry unit. The students have been working diligently to write an information report about their animal. They have learnt about their features, habitats and diets. The students have also created an amazing 3D clay model of their creature. This week, we are going to build a diorama of its habitat. To conclude our unit, students are going to present their writing and model to the class. It has been so much fun exploring and learning about minibeasts!



Mathematics



We have been learning about data. Students have learnt how to generate a survey question, survey their classmates and use tally marks to collect their data and represent this data on a bar chart or pictograph. Students are also learning how to analyse and interpret the data to talk about what they notice and make comparisons about the data.




Five children were playing a card game.

Eden and Sade using CUBES




Last week we learned about using the CUBES method to solve worded problems.


This helped us break down exactly what each problem was asking us, and how we can solve it. We drew out models of the problems to help us solve them and check what the answers were.


LEARNING IN THE **4/5/6 AREA**


SPORT


ART

3/4's are learning to make 2D shapes look 3D by shading with grey lead pencils




4/5/6's have begun modelling their Courtney Mattison inspired coral pieces and they are stunning!
